



Product Definitions

The JSOU Press publishes a variety of academic materials that address United States Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) priorities and issues of interest to the Special Operations Forces (SOF) enterprise. All manuscripts should follow the editorial standards as outlined in the [JSOU Press Manuscript Submission Format Guidance](#) and the *Chicago Manual of Style, 18th Edition*.

Publication Types

- **Quick look.** A quick look is a brief (4–12 pages) overview related to key topics of concern and issues of interest to USSOCOM and the SOF enterprise. Subject to double-blind peer review.
- **Occasional paper.** An occasional paper is more in-depth than a quick look, though still a shorter publication (typically 15–30 pages). Similar to a white paper, an occasional paper contains original research or perspective and addresses an academic audience. Subject to double-blind peer review.
- **Monograph.** A monograph provides a deep dive into a single topic or aspect of a complex topic. It should include new, original, and thoroughly researched information that fills a gap in the collective knowledge about the topic. A monograph may have more than one author, but it must focus on one subject and be written for an academic audience. Subject to double-blind peer review.
- **Edited volume.** An edited volume is a collection of chapters that presents information related to a common theme. Each chapter is typically written by a different author and should provide original and well-researched insight into a topic that relates to the book's overall theme. Subject to double-blind peer review.
- **Commentary.** A commentary provides analyses, critical insight, or exposure on a specific topic important to the SOF enterprise. It may be written by more than one author. Commentaries may aim to further research or conversation and should be backed by references, examples, and other evidence. Any submission that is primarily opinion in nature, addresses a general audience, or does not include new research will be considered only as commentary. No peer review required.
